Dinniman Recognizes Penn Township Eagle Scouts

State Senator Andy Dinniman recently recognized two Eagle Scouts from Penn Township for achieving the highest advancement rank in the Boy Scouts of America.

Dinniman recognized Logan William Coyle and Michael Joseph Bagatta, both of Troop #191 in Avondale, with special Senate citations in honor of the milestone.

“I want to thank both Logan and Michael for their service to the community and recognize their families and all of the individuals whose support helped them reach the title of Eagle Scout,” Dinniman said. “The Boy Scouts of America continue to shape generations of Americans into strong, brave and responsible citizens, and these two young men represent the best and brightest that scouting has to offer.”

For his Eagle Scout project, Coyle constructed improvements and landscape upgrades to the Avon

Grove Nazarene Academy preschool located on State Road in West Grove. He built and installed three picnic tables, including one ADA-accessible table, to be used during the school year and summer camp activities. In addition, Coyle constructed a 200-foot landscape barrier along a newly installed fence line between the academy’s playground and its parking lot. The barrier included building mulch beds and planting shrubs and perennials. The entire project was completed in June 2015.

For his project, Bagatta built a Veteran’s Memorial Garden at the front entrance of Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary Church in West Grove. The project was completed in October of 2014 and dedicated at a special Veterans Memorial Mass on the Sunday before Veterans Day (November 9, 2014). Bagatta and his troop will continue to maintain the garden. “It’s great to see young people instilled with the spirit of civic duty and volunteerism,” Dinniman said. “I also want to commend both Logan and Michael for incorporating their service projects into their faith traditions.”

Dinniman, who serves as minority chair of the Senate Education Committee, also talked with both young men and their families about their future plans for college.

Keep it clean for the stream



With the White Clay Creek to the East and the Big Elk Creek to the West, Penn Township is uniquely situated between two high quality watersheds - the Christina Basin and the Chesapeake Bay Watershed. Proper management of stormwater is a federal, state, county, and township mandate that we cannot accomplish without your help.

What is StormWater Management?

Stormwater is rainwater and melted snow that runs off streets, lawns, farms, and construction and industrial sites. Under natural conditions, stormwater is absorbed into the ground, where it is filtered and ultimately replenishes aquifers or slowly flows through forests and meadows into streams and rivers.

In developed areas, however, impervious surfaces such as pavement and building roofs prevent precipitation from naturally soaking into the ground. Instead, the water runs rapidly into storm drains, sewer systems, and drainage ditches. The resulting rush of stormwater discharge can cause infrastructure damage, downstream flooding, and stream bank erosion. In addition, the bacteria and other pollutants not filtered from stormwater can contaminate streams, rivers, and coastal waters. The most common sources of stormwater pollution are pet waste, leaves, grass clippings, detergents, fertilizers, oil and grease, and trash like plastic bags, drink containers, and wrappings.

Stormwater management addresses these

concerns through a variety of techniques, including strategic site design, measures to control the sources of runoff, and thoughtful landscape planning.

What you can do...

You can help by keeping grass clippings, pet waste, and vehicle waste such as oil away from storm drains and streams. Clean up after your pets in common areas. Use fertilizer sparingly. Plant trees along streams. Redirect downspouts onto lawn or natural areas. Create a rain garden.

From Zoning to Building.... First, Get the Facts

While we ran this article previously, with spring coming it bears repeating.

Among the most frequent inquiries to the township office are questions regarding building permits and property use. Here are a few rules of thumb and important phone numbers for when you are considering building or adding to your property. Failing to obtain the appropriate permit can result in fines and the township may even mandate that a structure or improvement be removed.

• **Why do I need a Permit?**

Approximately 10 years ago the State of Pennsylvania mandated all municipalities adopt a Building Code known as the Uniform Construction Code (UCC). The UCC provides specific requirements and exemptions for building projects.

Before starting any construction, repair, renovation or addition it's always best to call the office to determine if you will need a permit. Permits are put in place for your safety, they ensure that proper codes are being followed and work is being done safely and in compliance with the UCC. If you are ever uncertain whether you need a permit it's always best to call and ask.

Please note, demolition also requires a township permit and possibly a permit from other agencies. Do not demolish a structure without contacting the township and obtaining the appropriate approvals.

• **Permit Process Checklist**

Property owners will decide on a contractor and together they will come up with plans to be submitted with the permit application.

Obtain proper applications from either the township website or the office. The Property owner and contractor will complete applications together. Applications must be turned into the office along with, both written and electronic, two (2) sets of clear construction drawings, two (2) plot plans, two (2) copies of all applications, proof of Workman's compensation and insurance.

The applications will be turned into to the appropriate officer (building or zoning) for review. Once the office staff receives the approved permit back from the code officers they will contact the applicant to pick up permit and pay any accompanying fees.

Once the fees are paid and permit is picked up, work may start. Permit is valid for one (1) year from the time work begins.

When work is completed, applicant must contact the correct officer for final inspection.

If you require information regarding the township's zoning rules, regulations and requirements, copies of the zoning ordinance are available for purchase at the township office for \$50 per book. You can also stop by anytime during open office hours to take a look at the book. Office staff will try their best to answer your questions about building and zoning, but in some cases we may need to refer you to the building or zoning officer.

• **Road Occupancy Permits**

A Road Occupancy Permit is required for any work that will affect township roads or traffic, such as driveway replacements; tree removal; or utility work. The application may be obtained through the township office or on their website. ROP are handled by the township secretary, so all questions must be directed to the office. Fees and other specifications may be required; they are dependent on the type of work. Please note, when filling out the application starting and ending dates MUST be exact or the permit could become expired.

Items That Always Require Permits

- New buildings, renovations, additions, or installments
- Demolition
- Electrical and plumbing work
- Fences over 6-8 feet
- Basement renovations
- Sheds, accessory structures
- Signs
- Fire alarm and sprinkler systems
- Pools in excess of 24 inches high
- Decks/patios
- Driveway extensions
- Anything that effects a building's structure
- Boilers, water heaters, furnaces
- HVAC
- Drainage systems
- Home occupations

**If you have an HOA some changes, such as decks, need to be approved by them before coming to the township.*

Items That Don't Usually Require Permits

- Painting
- Re-roofing
- Siding replacements
- Window replacement when there is no major structural change
- Repaving or sealing driveways
- Installation of carpet or tile
- Cabinets

Updates

- ◆ **Intersection** - Supervisors continue to work on the expansion of the intersection at the Red Rose Inn. The state budget stalemate has slowed things as we continue to wait for word on a \$276,000 state grant to accompany the good faith promise funding of \$800,000 from PennDOT. In addition, Supervisors continue to fine tune the design of the intersection to best accommodate future needs of our community.
- ◆ **Red Rose** - Progress on the Red Rose Inn will continue with a new roof, windows, and brick pointing to preserve the building. Going forward, the Supervisors plan to investigate the development of a Community Center for the Red Rose Inn site.
- ◆ **Park** - This year the Penn Township Park will receive some new playground equipment and an adult active fitness park with expanded walking trail.
- ◆ **Penn Sports Park** - Keeping its promise to move forward on the acquisition of active fields, Penn Supervisors finalized the purchase of a 43-acre property located on Route 796 on Jan. 8 from Conard-Pyle. Currently farmed, the Supervisors will begin considering options for the development of the Penn Sports Park in the coming months.
- ◆ **Salt Shed/Garage** - Work for the township's salt shed will begin soon. It will be located on Old Lewis Road.
- ◆ **Pipeline** - Last fall, Penn Township facilitated a meeting between homeowners who currently have

Eastern Shore Natural Gas pipeline easements and the company to address a planned expansion for our township. During that meeting, residents and township officials were able to discuss with Eastern Shore sensitive areas and safety concerns with regard to the proposed expansion. While the expansion is still in the planning stages, Eastern Shore is working to incorporate the routes

discussed at the meeting into their plans and projecting a spring pre-filing at which time the public can review and comment officially. Unrelated to the expansion, Eastern Shore officials are in the area surveying to improve asset management for various mapping and reporting requirements for state and federal agencies. They will also be conducting their annual leak survey.

Project C.U.R.E. Collects and "Delivers Health and Hope to the World"

Project C.U.R.E. is a nonprofit organization that collects and distributes medical consumables and equipment to needy hospitals throughout the developing world. In June, 2015, it began leasing a large warehouse and office space in the Dansko building at 8 Federal Road.

The Denver-based organization has five other distribution centers in Arizona, Colorado, Illinois, Tennessee and Texas. The Project C.U.R.E. Mid-Atlantic Distribution Center here in Penn Township, at 65,000 sq. ft. will be one of its largest, accepting donated materials in an area from New York to Baltimore, and west to Lancaster.

"This location is perfect in many ways," said Kathy Hrenko, the Center's operations director. "We needed access for our volunteers, cargo shipments out to nearby ports, and medical surplus collections from hospitals and distributors. Each is essential for efficient operations, and this site has it all." The organization "delivers health and hope" to previously assessed hospitals using 40-foot cargo containers, provides travelers with luggage-sized C.U.R.E. Kits, and offers backpack-sized Kits for Kids full of

hygienic supplies. All are prepared by volunteers.

Hrenko, who took charge of the facility in October, has assembled a volunteer leadership team of healthcare professionals to oversee the center's sorting and inventorying of medical consumables. They will lead volunteer groups with no medical background from

community and faith-based organizations, service clubs, companies for team-building experience, college, high school, YMCA and scout groups. Both groups and individuals can sign up for 2 1/2-hour activity sessions online, at www.projectcure.org/serve (see Mid-Atlantic Distribution Center) or by calling the Project C.U.R.E. office at 610-345-0410.

"I want to make every volunteer experience both positive and fun," Hrenko said. "Our sorting center environment is very social, but there's also a sense that something you touch can literally save someone's life. Not many volunteer jobs can offer so much emotional return on your commitment."

From its beginning in 1999 as an orchestrated response to Y2K, Avon Grove Regional Emergency Management, AGREM, has come to be known as the preparedness group for the residents in the Avon Grove School district.

A 501c 3 organization, AGREM's Board comprised of emergency managers and experienced township officials have been busy the past 17 years developing and updating municipal and regional emergency plans, maintaining a multi-municipal communication system, purchasing and equipping a mobile Incident Command Post, and establishing a regional Emergency Operations Center.

In September of 2015 AGREM completed a project conceived of by the late Mike Predmore and placed our AM radio station, AGREM 1670, on the air to provide routine weather and traffic information for motorists in our area. AGREM 1670 can also be received on your computer or smartphone by way of a link available on our agem.org website. Having this resource in place allows us during an emergency to commandeer the broadcast to provide evacuation directions and available shelters should there be a hazard endangering life and property in our Avon Grove area. Tax Information

The Township office receives many inquiries regarding taxes. Here is a guide to what taxes are charged, when you can expect a bill, and what entity is the collector. Tax bills are not generated by anyone in the Township Office, nor are taxes accepted for payment at the office.

Earned Income Tax (EIT) is assessed at a rate of .5 percent. Any wage earner who lives in or works in Penn Township owes this tax. Usually,

employers withhold this tax from a wage earner's pay check. Whether it is withheld or not, the tax is owed and a local tax form must be filed.



Local Services Tax (LST) is \$52.00 per year and is usually withheld by the employer. This tax supports municipal and emergency services. There is a low income exemption for people earning less than \$12,000. This exemption requires the submission of a form. EIT and LST are collected by Keystone

Collections. Keystone was awarded the collection of these local taxes by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Municipal or Township Real Estate Taxes are assessed at a rate of .53 mills. The tax bills are sent in early **February**. A change for 2016 is that Penn is no longer using an elected Tax Collector but rather, the

Treasurer of Chester County. If you do not receive your bill, please contact them. The Treasurer can be reached at 610-344-6370 or via the website at www.chesco.org.

County of Chester Taxes are sent on **January 15** of each year. More information regarding assessment, payment options, and locations are available at www.chesco.org. Avon Grove School District Taxes are sent on July 1 of each year. For more on those call 610-869-2441 x1017.
